Private Pesticide Applicator Training – Register in advance!

This is year #3 of the new system all applicators must utilize to get certified as a Pesticide Applicator, so most have not yet analyzed the process. Please make sure you check your PAT license and get the process started if you need to renew before next application year OR if you have personnel on the farm that should be newly certified.

We are not allowed to take walk-in's, nor are we allowed to sell the books through county offices. Please make sure you give yourself time to get the book ordered and sent to you ahead of the training dates.

Private Applicator (allows you to apply on your owned/controlled land) certification options for 2026:

Step #1. You must order the PAT training book from the PAT store website, <https://patstore.wisc.edu/>

Start by clicking on the Private Applicator button, then click on the appropriate category on the left hand side of the page. For most, it will be the '100/101 General Farming', but some may want to do Fruit Crops or Greenhouse/Nursery. Click 'Add to Cart'. Before you pay for the manual (\$43), think about how you want to take the test and if you want to attend a training session. If you want to attend a training class (February 4 at the Lena Town Hall or March 17 at the Shawano County Courthouse), you will need to click 'Continue Shopping', then click on the "Training Classes" tab on the left. You will need to scroll through the alphabetical list of counties that are hosting training to find Oconto or Shawano for the two options left in our area, then put in the number of attendees and click add to cart (\$10).

You will then be able to checkout and pay via credit card. If you do not have a computer or a credit card, request a paper order form from either the Shawano, Marinette, or Langlade Extension offices, but make sure you do so at least a couple weeks ahead of when you want to attend training/testing. NOTE: If you either do not want to attend a local training or cannot make one of the two dates available, you can choose to Self-study or do training via the on-line platform. On-line training is free and allows you to pass the exam with 50% correct just as with the live training, but there are time limits. Via self-study, you go through the materials, then schedule a time to take the test at the Shawano, Marinette, or Langlade Extension offices (or Green Bay DATCP center). With self-study, you need 70% correct to pass.

Scott Reuss, Crops/Soils Educator, moderates the live training sessions, which are delivered live via zoom with presentations done by PAT staff. In case of technical difficulties, Reuss will be able to deliver the full training but is not allowed to offer the training on different/additional dates. Wisconsin's Cover Crop - Crop Insurance Rebate Program – Open for applications

Interested participants may enroll acres planted in cover crops which will be planted to an insurable crop the following growing season. During the 2025-2026 application period the program has \$800,000, or 160,000 acres, of coverage to award on a first-come, first-served basis. Eligible applicants will receive a \$5 per acre rebate on their summer crop insurance premium for every acre enrolled and verified in the program.

- Producers or landowners that received federal or state cost-share or incentives for planting cover crops are not eligible for the program.
 - Eg: EQIP, CSP, Producer-Led Watershed Protection Grant, SWRM Cost Share, Lake Management Grant, River Protection Grant, TRM Grants
- Applicants will need their FSA-578 and FSA maps to complete the application.
 - Contact your local FSA office to obtain these forms if needed.
- There is no limit on the number of acres an applicant can apply for.

Thursday, Feb. 12: Selecting, Planting, and General Management of Fruit Crops This session will focus on the different traits of our hardy fruit crops and aspects to think about when selecting cultivars. Then, we will discuss planting methods, young plant care, and soil/nutrient management for optimum plant health.

Thursday, March 12: Pest Management in Backyard Fruit Crops. All of our hardy fruit crops face pressure from various insects and diseases. This session will help you identify the pests that may impact your fruits and help you form management plans/practices that will minimize their impacts.

Thursday, March 26: Pruning of Fruit Crops (Trees focus). Proper pruning and training of fruit trees, shrubs, and vines is one of the most important management practices of raising fruit crops. This hands-on workshop will allow you to better understand tree/shrub morphology, proper pruning cuts and decision-making, and see the different approaches when working in young, bearing, and older trees.

Manure Applicator Training

The Manure Applicator Training workshops are a critical way that custom manure applicators and farms can help their personnel understand the safety aspects of working with manure. Safety in this sense means many different aspects – personal safety, co-worker and other farm personnel safety, road / travel safety, and environmental safety. The three-hour workshops offer a fairly fast-paced look at these different concepts and include hands-on situation analysis and planning work. There is a series of training events across the state, with two of them being held in our counties:

Marinette and Oconto Counties received a DATCP grant (NMFE) that allows them to pay producers or landowners to attend a Nutrient Management Planning class and to complete a Nutrient Management Plan (NMP).

These workshops are designed to help you better understand how to manage your plan appropriately for your farm and fields and optimize profitability. You will be able to know what types of questions to ask to ensure your plan is maximizing your farm's potential.

Participants are eligible for one \$700 stipend per farm.

Additional possible reimbursements include:

\$750 per farm for soil tests – tests from a certified lab are needed every 4 years for NMPs.
\$100 per farm for manure analysis, if needed.

To qualify for financial incentives in 2026, landowners/producers must:

- 1)** Attend the first day of the course (or contact us for virtual training options, if you cannot attend the planned training date).
- 2)** Attend a second day of training (usually a couple of hours) to work on your NMP.
- 3)** Have soil lab results less than 4 years old or complete soil sampling in 2026.
- 4)** Complete an NMP in SNAP+. Some training attendees will complete the NMP during the training.
- 5)** Provide required documentation to your county Land and Water Conservation office.

Please, be sure to bring all the materials listed below to the training, if accessible:

- Numbered field maps with acreages
- Soil tests results if available from within the past 3 years and maps of sampling locations.
- Livestock inventory (Number of each species / different size classifications / estimate of manure)
- Manure (Storage capacity & Application rates per acre)
- Updated crop rotation plan
- Laptop (optional but highly recommended, limited devices available for use)

Analyzing grain crop cost of production and potential returns for 2026 is going to likely create some headaches. What types of grain marketing practices should we consider when looking at a sideways and relatively unprofitable market? How can we integrate crop insurance programs with our marketing decision-making, or should they be completely separate? What should our farm be doing for crop insurance coverage as we look toward the March 16 deadline?

There are a lot of questions on most minds as we think about 2026 crop production economics. Crop insurance and grain marketing play big roles in most farms' risk management plans – whether those plans are formal or informal. Understanding crop insurance and knowing about changes to crop insurance options & opportunities is a critical part of making sound decisions for your farm's insurance plans. Thinking about the potential grain marketing tools that you can use and how/when to consider using them in the 2026 pricing climate can also help you approach those decisions properly. The discussion and exercises at this workshop will help you choose your crop insurance plan with better confidence and give you goals & tactics to consider for your marketing plan.

Sulfur rate of return in winter wheat – 2025 results

Three sites of sulfur rate research in winter wheat were conducted for 2025 harvest, soil testing indicated that S was not recommended according to the Sulfur Availability Index at the non-responsive Abrams East site, but was recommended at the other two sites. All three sites had below average grain and straw yields.
