FSA Crop Program Decision-Making Workshops

Extension and Farm Service Agency personnel are cooperating to bring producers two opportunities to learn more about the important decisions that need to be made in the near future regarding the new farm bill's ARC/PLC decision.

Wednesday, January 15, 10 a.m. - Noon Thursday, February 6, 1 to 3:30 p.m. **Lena Town Hall** (6087 Goatsville Road; NW of Lena) **Pound Town Hall** (W8484 Cty. Hwy. B, Coleman)

Many of you remember making the ARC vs. PLC decision a few years ago and now we have the opportunity to make that decision again. This time around, there are a few significant differences in the decision-making processes that will be undergone; as well as the pricing situation that will make the decision a bit less straightforward than last time. We still have the same three options from which to choose: PLC (Price Loss Coverage; ARC-CO (Agriculture Risk Coverage – County); or ARC-IC (Agriculture Risk Coverage – Individual).

The discussion at this workshop will focus on opportunities for yield updating, program deadlines and requirements; and what types of information you are going to want to use to make the decision for your farm and crop situations. We will also look at the tools that are available for you to use in the process and the generalized realities of the three different programs, but knowing that every farm is going to have a slightly different situation.

The sign up deadline to make this set of decisions is March 15, but there are steps that may take extra time, and many of you will have appointments with FSA far in advance of the deadline. Taking part in the discussion at one of these events will help you understand the possibilities and analyze the options and how they may work for your individual FSA Farms, as that is the scale at which the decisions are made, not just one decision for your entire cropping operation.



Safe Wisconsin Produce is a
Department of Agriculture, Trade and
Consumer Protection (DATCP) program
to adopt federal food safety regulations
in a manner that makes sense for our
state's produce growers to ensure the
safety and wholesomeness of food
produced in Wisconsin. The program is
working to educate Wisconsin produce
growers covered by the Produce
Safety Rule before on-farm inspections
begin.

This program is the result of the FSMA of 2011, which changed the focus of U.S. food supply safety efforts from a response to a prevention approach. FSMA is put into action by several rules, including the Produce Safety Rule.



What is the Produce Safety Rule grower training course?

If your farm is covered by the Produce Safety Rule, the next step is to attend a Food and Drug Administration (FDA)approved Produce Safety Rule grower training course. Under the rule, a produce farm must have an employee who has completed this course. The course provides training to ensure a responsible party employed by the farm understands the required food safety practices. Upon completion, you will have a better understanding of how your farm's practices stack up against Produce Safety Rule requirements. You will also learn more about exceptions and exemptions available under the rule.

This one-day course provides a foundation of good agricultural practices and co-management information, Food Safety Modernization Act (FSMA) Produce Safety Rule requirements, and details for how to develop a farm food safety plan.

After attending the course, you are eligible to receive a certificate from the Association of Food and Drug Officials (AFDO) that verifies you completed the training. To receive an AFDO certificate, a participant must be present for the entire training and submit the appropriate paperwork to their trainer at the end of the course.

What will I learn?

Trained and certified staff from the Safe Wisconsin Produce program and its partner organizations conduct a seven-hour course that covers the following topics:

- Introduction to produce safety
- Worker health, hygiene, and training
- Soil amendments
- Wildlife, domesticated animals, and land use
- Agricultural water
 - Part I: Production water
 - Part II: Postharvest water
- Postharvest handling and sanitation
- How to develop a farm food safety plan

How do I register?

You must pre-register either online at https://fsmaproducesafety.wiscweb.
wisc.edu/registration/ or contact your local University of Wisconsin-Madison Division of Extension office for a paper registration. The training cost is \$75 and includes:

- Produce Safety Alliance grower training manual
- AFDO certificate of attendance
- Refreshments
- Lunch

PRIVATE PESTICIDE APPLICATOR TRAINING

You have two options to become certified or recertified as a private pesticide applicator. The first is to attend one of the private pesticide applicator training programs conducted by Extension and then satisfactorily complete the evaluation at the end of that session. The second is to study the materials on your own and arrange to take the test in the Marinette office. Either method has a \$40 fee which covers the five years of the license period.

A minimum score of 50 percent must be achieved on the evaluation administered at the end of the training. **Those choosing the test only option must score 70 percent.** The test is open book and you are allowed 2 hours, with retakes (if necessary) at no extra cost.

There are two training & test sessions which will be held in our immediate area this season:

Wednesday, January 29 Pound Town Hall (east edge of Coleman on Hwy. B)

Friday, February 28 Oconto Falls Library (251 N. Main St.)

Training sessions will begin at 10 a.m. Most participants are done around 3p.m.

You are welcome to come early and discuss any type of crop management issue with Scott as he gets the room and materials ready for the training, he is usually there by 9:30 at the latest. (Shawano County is hosting trainings on Jan. 23 & Feb. 11, if the above dates do not work.)

-Is the Private Applicator Training the right category for me??

If you answer **yes** to any of the questions below, you should become certified in the correct Commercial Pesticide Applicator category. Call Scott Reuss at the Marinette office, 715-732-7510 to find out the logistics of that process:

- Do you custom spray on more than 500 acres OR for more than 3 other producers?
- Do you custom bale and apply propionic acid on more than 500 baled acres?
- Do you apply restricted-use pesticides to ANY of your own non cropland acreage?
