

FAIR PASSES

NOTE: The Family Pass only includes immediate family members living in the same household. Please make checks payable to:

MEAL TICKET INFO FOR FOOD STAND

Meal tickets are \$40. Only youth exhibitors (including FFA) and leaders will be able to purchase meal tickets. Parents of the youth exhibitors will not be able to purchase them unless they are leaders. Please make checks payable to: Marinette County 4-H.

- •Breakfast will be served from 7:30-10:30 am at the south window by the soda. Cold cereal, boiled eggs, milk & fruit will be served for breakfast only. "Breakfast" is for breakfast only.
- •Lunch and dinner also will need to be used on the same day assigned. They will need to be used up by 9:00 pm of that day and 4:00 pm on Sunday.

FOOD STAND HELP NEEDED

MEMBERS WORKING AT FOOD STAND

Members must work a full shift or more or contact the Extension office to do alternative positions to receive some of the awards or travel. The basic guidelines are as follows (Parents should not work a member's shift for the member to receive the credit):

- 1. 4-H members (3rd grade and up) are encouraged to work a shift in the food stand.
- 2. Members purchasing meal passes must work a full shift in the food stand.
- 3. Members participating in the county-sponsored event form activities must work a full shift in the food stand and are strongly encouraged to work an extra shift at the fair or help with set up on Wednesday before the Fair or clean up on Sunday evening of the Fair or, if needed, during the Fair.
- 4. Clubs should wait at the back door of the food stand when their shift will be starting to get instructions from the food stand manager before the shift starts.
- 5. All members/people working in the stand need to be working during their shift. You need to eat before or after your shift, no leaving during your shift to eat.
- 6. Drinks are not free while you are working in the stand or at any other time.

REMEMBER: NO DRINKING/EATING DURING YOUR SHIFT.

Take care to fill out food stand sign-up sheets as they will be checked after the Fair to verify volunteer obligations. If you are not available to help during your club's shift at the food stand, contact the 4-H office for an alternative volunteer opportunity.

Shifts available to clubs to work at the Food Stand can be found at the end of this newsletter. Help is also needed on Wednesday, August 25; will have limited menu.

FOOD STAND DRESS ETIQUETTE - FROM THE FOOD STAND COMMITTEE

Hats must be worn and hair pulled back. Do not wear flip flops, sandals, short shorts nor mini skirts. Comfortable closed toe shoes should be worn. T-shirts or sleeved shirts must be worn; NO spaghetti straps permitted.

YOUTH CLUB FLOWER DISPLAYS

An entry consists of two pots with flowers planted in them. Each club may have one entry. They will be judged on Wed., Aug. 25.

IMPORTANT CHANGE IN DATES/ TIMES FOR BRINGING EXHIBITS

All non-animal exhibits will be entered on *Wed.*, *Aug.* 25, between the hours of noon and 8 pm. Face-to-face judging will take place during this time for junior fair entries. All animals will be brought to the Fair on *Thurs.*, *Aug* 26, between the hours of 9 am and noon.

<u>VET SCIENCE, EXOTIC ANIMALS, DOG, CAT, POCKET PETS (NOT RABBITS)</u>

Dogs, caged birds, guinea pigs, hamsters, and cat projects will be judged face-to-face the Saturday before the Fair, on *August 21*, at the Fairgrounds.

DAIRY AND BEEF EXHIBITORS

Please call the Superintendents, either Troy VanDe-Walle at 715-938-4014 or Dave VanDeWalle at 715-927 -3838, no later than the first Saturday in August with the exact number of animals you will be showing.



DATES FOR POLLURUM TEST-ING OF POULTRY TO BE SHOWN AT THE FAIR

Any birds over four months of age need to be pullorum tested. Pullorum testing for poultry will be held at the fairgrounds on *July 17*, *July 31*, *and*

August 7 from 10 am-1pm each day. Poultry need to be tested at one of those dates to be shown at the fair. Any questions, please contact Rich Kempka at 920-897-2070.

REMEMBER FAIR BOARD POLICY FOR EXHIBITORS

Once in place, any exhibit removed from the Fairgrounds prior to the end of the Fair, without prior approval from the Fair Board of Directors or upon veterinary advice, that exhibitor will be barred from exhibiting the remainder of that Fair and the next two (2) annual fairs.

COGGINS TEST REQUIRED FOR HORSES

All horses must have the current calendar year Coggins test to exhibit at the county fair and state horse show.

Horses showing any symptoms of contagious or infectious disease will NOT be permitted to exhibit. Check other rules and regulations in the Fair Premium List.

FACE TO FACE JUDGING

Face-to-face judging provides an opportunity for the youth to communicate with the judge (one-on-one) on details of his or her exhibit. This judging style gives the judge the opportunity to directly ask questions. It provides an opportunity to understand why the exhibit was selected for construction, if there were any problems with it & tools used to create the exhibit. The judge can then use this discussion to decide the placing.

ATTENTION ANIMAL EXHIBITORS

- ■When entering your animal for the Fair, also list a non-animal exhibit or poster in that particular project, in case your animal gets sick so that you can still have something entered.
- ■If you are showing two or more different animals, talk to the Superintendents involved so that classes can be adjusted for everyone to exhibit.
- ■If you are a dairy, livestock &/or horse exhibitor, please remember to keep trash out of the manure at the Fair. This inc. cans, paper cups, twine, wire, medication containers & needles. Please use the trash barrels in the barns.

CLOVERBUDS

These young members do not need to submit entry forms to show at the Fair. They do need to fill out a 3"x5" card w/name, age, club, & item being entered, and take it to the Clothing Bldg. Cloverbuds will have face-to-face judging on Wed., Aug 25, noon-8 pm, or you can drop off the items without seeing the judge. Cloverbuds may enter up to eight items.

CAMPING NEAR THE FAIRGROUNDS

4-H families wanting to camp during the Fair may call the Village Clerk at 715-856-5341 to camp at Evergreen Park, in Wausaukee. The park is across the creek on the north side of the Fairgrounds.

PREPARING YOUR ITEMS TO EXHIBIT

Be sure to read the rules in the Fair premium listing. Entry tags need to be securely attached before judging. Remove and keep the bottom part of the entry tag. It is used as a claim check to pick up your items on Sunday at 5 p.m.

FAIR ENTRY FORMS

Each 4-H family should have received their youth entry forms and a premium book in the mail. Remember, the deadline to enter youth entries and open animal entries is July 7th.

MECHANICAL SCIENCES

YOUTH TRACTOR/MACHINERY SAFETY CERTIFICATION TRAINING OFFERED

The Marinette and Oconto offices of UW-Madison, Division of Extension, are offering certification training for the youth Tractor & Machinery Safety permit. Youth that are between the ages of 12 and 16 need to have this certification to be able to legally drive any type of farm implement or tractor on public roadways when working for their family farms, or other farms after the age of 14. Youth not having a driver's license should also have the certification for farm insurance purposes.

Training will be conducted at three in-person instruction days, plus self study of the materials. Scott Reuss, Agriculture Agent, will be leading the course and overseeing students at the testing and skills building portions. There is a registration fee of \$40, which includes all course training materials. Registration is required. To register, e-mail the students' name, mailing address, contact phone number, and student and parent e-mail addresses to scott.reuss@wisc.edu Reuss will send an invoice for the registration fee along with forms which need to be signed to begin the course. You can also request a registration form by calling Reuss at 715-732-7510, or watch for it in the agriculture newsletter.

Training dates are *Tuesday*, *July 13*; *Tuesday*, *July 20*; and the testing and skills reviews will be conducted on *Thursday*, *July 22nd*. Each day of in-person training starts at 9 a.m. and lasts until 3 p.m. and will take place at the Pound Town Hall on the east edge of Coleman. State law requires that youth need to be 12 by the date of the testing to be eligible for the certificate. If you have any questions about eligibility or requirements for training, or the course methodology this year, contact Scott Reuss as above.



4-H Club Meetings

Almost every 4-H club holds **regular** club meetings. Even within the same club, no two club meetings are the same. Ideally, every meeting should have three parts—**recreation** (fun), business, and learning. Youth leadership plays a huge role in the success of a club.

Most clubs have youth officers (president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, and other selected roles) who are responsible for running each meeting. Youth leaders not only gain excellent life skills, they help to keep the meeting relevant and fun for members of all ages. All youth have a responsibility to contribute to their clubs through their voice and their actions!

What is my role as an adult?

Adults help create a safe, positive atmosphere for all 4-H members when they empower and encourage youth. While at a meeting, it's important to be a positive role model for everyone in attendance. Caring adults play an important role in the mental health of youth, and 4-H can help connect youth with positive adults.

Make this a positive experience.

- 1. Actively listen to all 4-H members.
- 2. Let youth run the meeting. It's their club!
- 3. Attend as many meetings as possible.
- 4. Ask your club leader how you can help.
- 5. If you have a hobby or skill, consider offering to be a guest speaker!

Should I stay or should I go?

It's strongly recommended that parents/guardians attend the 4-H meeting with your child. Club meetings provide great opportunities to learn with other club members, but the learning doesn't stop there. By attending the meeting, you can reflect on the meeting together and continue the education outside the club.

How is the meeting run?

Most 4-H clubs use **parliamentary procedure** to make club decisions. See if you can put the five steps of this procedure in order. Each step is written in **bold**. The answers are found at the bottom of the adult edition.

Re-state the Motion—The president restates the motion before the group votes.	1.
Discussion —The motion is discussed by all members. Members might want to bring up good or bad things about the motion, or maybe find some ways that it needs to be changed.	2
Motion—A motion is a request that something can be done. Only one motion should be placed before the group at one time. A motion can be discussed and changed.	3
Vote—The group votes to decide if they will pass or deny the motion. Voting usually happens by voice. Members say "aye" if they agree, and "nay" if they disagree. Voting sometimes happens in other ways (secret ballot, show of hands).	4. 5.
