ASSOCIATION BOARD ELECTIONS - SEEKING TO FILL OFFICER POSITIONS

Board elections will be held during Achievement Day/ Leader Recognition on January 14. Association meetings are held at 6:30 p.m. on the 3rd Monday of every month (rotating locations) with the exception of Aug. & Dec. (no meeting). In addition to descriptions below, board member responsibilities include planning the annual 4-H calendar & annual budget & working with Extension Program Educator to determine 4-H policies and goals, determine training needs, make decisions about the county 4-H program and carry out other business of the Association. This is a great way to get involved!

President: (two year term) Presides at all meetings of the Leaders Association and acts as Chair of Board meetings. President and Extension Program Educator work together to solve problems and plan educational opportunities.

Secretary: (two year term) Keeps minutes of all meetings of the Leaders Association & turns them into the 4-H office for the 4-H newsletter. Brings copy of minutes to each meeting. Works with the Extension Office in getting out correspondence & communications when necessary.


Youth Reps (2): (1 or 2 year term) Works as active member together with other board members and 4-H Program Educator in a youth-adult partnership model including attending regular meetings, collaborating on 4 -H Leader Association projects, providing input & making decisions, & setting goals for the county 4-H program. Representatives should be at least 12 years old.

IMPORTANT ANNUAL CLUB FINANCIAL AND CHARTER PAPERWORK UPDATE



Each 4-H club or group is

required to complete financial review and Charter renewal process annually. The deadline for submitting the financial review (covering the fiscal year July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2023) to the Extension office was September 1st, if your club has not submitted the financial review, this must be done as soon as possible. The deadline for submitting the annual club charter to the Extension office is November 1st. These dates are set by the UW-Madison, Division of Extension state office to comply with IRS deadlines. A club that does not complete paperwork in a timely fashion risks no longer being recognized as a 4-H club or group which could lead to dissolution of the club. PROJECT SUPPORT FOR YOUR SPARKS

Youth who join 4-H are often excited about the many, many projects they can choose to explore. There are so many Sparks (or things they want to learn about)! Yet, if their Spark doesn't have a local project leader to support their learning, that excitement can turn to questions. They may not know how to get started on their own.

Clover to the rescue!! Clover is an online smorgasbord of sparks, interactive activities, and fun. It was created by the National 4-H Council in collaboration with more than 100 universities throughout the United States. And it's FREE and ready for youth, parents, and educators to dive into.



To start exploring: 1. Go to <u>4-h.org/clover</u> 2. Create a login 3. Click on activities 4. Search for your Sparks. It's that simple. In Clover, you can connect with others in your club or group, track your progress through pins and achievements, and best of all, explore your Sparks! Most activities can be accessed in different formats (interactive online, basic webpage, or download PDF), making access flexible based on your local needs and bandwidth.

An honest note about the site: • Is Clover perfect? No. • Might there be moments of frustration as you learn to navigate the system? Most likely. • Does it get easier as you go? Yes. • Is the content worth it? Absolutely!

2023-24 PROJECT YEAR BEGAN OCT. 1

Our new enrollment year for 2024 began on October 1.

Members and leaders must re-enroll each year by November 30. Regular members must be in 3rd gr or older.

Cloverbuds (children in 5K through 2nd grade) should be listed in your club enrollment. Cloverbuds can participate in club activities. They can exhibit at the County Fair, only in the Cloverbud category, and do not receive premiums.

Re-enrollment deadline is November 30, 2023. *New members can join at any time, but must enroll by May 1 to enter in the Fair.

*May 1 is also the deadline to add or drop projects. *You must be enrolled in a project in order to exhibit at the Fair in that project.

We hope that your 4-H club will have a special promotion to tell the benefits of 4-H in your respective communities this fall. Invite your friends to join!!

4-H TRIPS

Teens interested in attending trips should fill out the Marinette County Sponsored Event Application. First round was due Oct. 1. All information regarding age requirements and trips were included in the leaders packet at the Fair. Following that, applications are due Feb. 1 and applicants will be interviewed at the February 4-H Association Meeting.

4-H Leaders' Association Meeting September 18, 2023—Town of Pound Hall, Coleman

President Jennie Pillath called the meeting to order at 6:04pm.

Secretary's report: Anne made a motion to accept the secretary's report as written in the newsletter. Dorothy seconded. Motion carried.

Treasurer's Report: New computer and printer arrived. Julia reported that she is running into issues with checks. She was wondering if it is possible to get a debit card. Aimee said the lack of a debit card is due to 4-H state policies. They are working on a new policy. Looking ahead to the future, Stephenson does not have a debit option, only credit card. Steven made a motion to change the location of the Association's account to BMO. Anne seconded. Motion carried. Julia is sorting through the bills from the raffle and food stand. Morgan made a motion to pay the bills and the report. Steve seconded. Motion carried.

Anne made a motion to get a Kwik Trip gift card as a donation to a leader who was recently in a serious car accident. Julia seconded. Motion carried.

Aimee's Update: AFR's were due on September 1. State is going to be strict with deadlines. Club charters are due November 1. For reenrollment, there will be a new training. Aimee and Alexis are looking to have a training for all leaders. More details to come. There is also a concern that the number of leaders/volunteers is shrinking as the number of youth is increasing. Aimee is looking into the barriers that may be in the way for new leaders/volunteers to help make the process easier. Aimee also introduced Alexis and her role as Aimee takes on a state assignment.

Alexis will be creating a new Teen Leadership Group. The first meeting will be Tuesday, the 26th at the fairgrounds. It is for 7th grade and above. She is going to let the youth determine the direction of the group and what they will be doing. She also created and sent a 4-H promotional flyer to the local schools. The American Spirit trip registration is Oct. 1 to Nov 3. Registration is in 4Honline. Club/Outstanding nomination forms are now due the 29th instead of the 22nd.

Committee Reports:

Food Stand: Overall, successful. It will need a new microwave. Brownies were a hit. The inspector came opening morning & the stand passed the inspection with flying colors. The inspector said that the license the food stand has does not require cooks to have the certification that other licenses do. However, Aimee mentioned that 4-H state requires it along with the manager being a fully approved leader. Anne will not be the manager next year, so the food stand will be in need of new manager.

Raffle: A report was handed out with the club payouts versus profit.

Fair Board: October or November will be a premium book meeting. This is the year to review the book and make changes. Let Lisa or Rich know of any suggestions.

Royalty: New queen, Tilly, has made a suggestion for a community service project. She is going to see if the new teen group might be able to take it on. New Royalty will be in the Peshtigo Historical Days parade. The committee is also looking into the possibility of having a court with younger youth involved. Outgoing queen, Alexus Birr, was thanked for her excellence in promoting 4-H and fulfilling her duties.

Reflect and Record

The end of summer is a great opportunity to stop and reflect on the past 4-H year. Many 4-H members reflect on their successes, their challenges, and their experiences through a 4-H record book. Record books are presented in a variety of ways, sometimes through journals, videos, or slideshow presentations. All of these formats allow 4-H members to reflect on their project goals and determine how much progress was made over the past year.

Keeping record books throughout a 4-H career will help youth end up with a summary of all that they've done through their time in 4-H. This summary can be helpful when filling out job and college applications. Record books may also be helpful when applying for county scholarships or awards.



Developing Life Skills

Keeping records of work during a 4-H career helps to grow important life skills.

- » Self-reflection on experiences and accomplishments
- » Goal setting for the future
- » Planning and organizing a successful project or experience
- » Critical thinking when challenges arise or things don't go quite as planned
- » Budgeting time to meet deadlines and budgeting money to cover the cost of supplies

Adults can create space for youth reflection.

- » Help your youth consider what their goals were for the past year and determine if they met their own expectations.
- » Begin to consider goals for next year. Ask questions like, "If you were going to do things again, how would you do them differently?"
- » Reflect regularly with your youth about their experiences at meetings and events.
- » Take a lot of pictures. Photos and videos are great ways to record participation in activities while also recording achievements.
- » Set aside a few minutes every month for 4-H youth to fill out records.

Clubs and counties may offer awards for keeping high quality records. Check with your local club leader or county educator to learn more.

Track Your Progress

4-H members like you do awesome things every year. Keeping track of what you do in 4-H can help you to talk about your accomplishments with others. Many members keep track of what they did with a 4-H record book. Record books can be really helpful when you apply for college, jobs, or scholarships! If you are unsure of what record keeping your county does, ask your 4-H educator or a club advisor. A sample might be posted on your county webpage.

What should I record?

There's a lot that you can do in 4-H, so keeping track of everything might seem like a lot of work. If you answer "Yes" to any of these questions, you should include it in your record.

- » Did you learn something?
- » Did you complete a project?
- » Did you accomplish a goal that you set for yourself?
- » Did you receive an award or a scholarship?
- » Did you travel somewhere with 4-H?
- » Did you spend or receive money for your project?
- » Did you make a presentation or give a speech?
- » Did you participate in a club activity?
- » Did you serve in a leadership role?

How do I record it?

Once you've got something to record, you have a lot of ways to keep track of it. Use whatever works best for you and the situation! You might use a mix of all of these things!

- » Write your record on a piece of paper, and keep all the paper in a folder.
- » Write all your records in a notebook.
- » Create a 4-H career scrapbook.
- » Set aside a box for ribbons, photos, and all your records.
- » Take a video of yourself where you talk about what you did.
- » Type your records in an online document.

If you store your records online, have an adult help you keep your information safe! It's always good to store an extra copy of your digital records somewhere.



Club officers should record their time spent learning to lead.

Records should always answer these questions:

- 1. What did you do?
- 2. When did you do it?
- 3. What did you learn along the way?
- 4. What important details do you want to remember?
